I hope to see you all at the Annual Meeting on November 16 at IWU, State Farm Hall, Rm 202.


Vladimir High School Exchange Student Education Committee Co-chairs: Carol Kerestes and Desiree Quizon-Colquitt

Five students and Dr. Karen Dennis from the School of Kinesiology and Recreation, along with two faculty from ISU's Department of Agriculture – Dr. Rob Rhykerd and Dr. Iuliia Protopop, and two faculty – Dr. Tara Kaczorowski and Allison Kroesch - and seven students from the Department of Special Education, traveled to Russia in May for a seventeen day short-term study abroad experience. The group flew into St. Petersburg and spent a weekend exploring the sites of this former Russian capital city including St. Isaac's Cathedral, the Hermitage (which was the former Winter Palace), an excursion to Pushkin (just south of St. Petersburg) to see Catherine's Palace (the Summer Palace), and another excursion to Peterhof Palace, located on the southern shore of the Gulf of Finland. A 12-hour overnight train ride from St. Petersburg to Vladimir was an exciting experience in itself.

Upon arriving in Vladimir, the group was met by their hosts from Vladimir State University's Institute of Physical Culture and Sports. While at Vladimir State University, the three groups each met with students and faculty from their respective departments.

For students in KNR, the next ten days were spent visiting classes, laboratories, sports facilities, hospitals, clinics, and schools, in addition to touring training facilities (Greco-Roman wrestling, gymnastics, ice skating, and soccer) and meeting many Olympic competitors and coaches that train in these facilities. The group received special individualized Masterclass training in kickboxing and pole exercise as well. They also participated in the "Last Bell" ceremony, which is similar to our commencement ceremony.

The agriculture faculty spent the next ten days with their colleagues from the College of Ecology, Biology and Chemistry. Regardless of differences in the length of the growing season, soil types and climate conditions between the two regions, researchers at both institutions face similar challenges (such as nutrient management and soil

quality). While in Vladimir, the group was able to visit the National research institute of peat and organic fertilizer, Vladimir agricultural research station and Water treatment lab. The trip presented the opportunity to identify the first joint research project. Dr. Protopop along with Dr. Dave Kopsell and one undergraduate student at ISU will partner with their colleagues from Vladimir State to conduct a comparative analysis of berries that can be cultivated in the Vladimir region and in Illinois. Dr. Protopop and her colleagues are very grateful for the opportunity to explore the potential collaboration with Vladimir State in agriculture and look forward to future developments.

Students and faculty from the College of Education spent the next five days visiting local kindergarten (early childhood), elementary, and middle level classrooms. Many of these classrooms included students with special needs (e.g. autism, hearing impairments). Additionally, the pre-service teachers learned about the history of the educational system in Russia and had the opportunity to discuss similarities and differences between Russian and American special education policies during a round table panel.

They had great opportunities for cultural immersion as the groups visited several historical sites, many that are UNESCO World Heritage Sites. The Vladimir State University hosts welcomed the groups most warmly and provided a rich and broad range of cultural experiences, including excursions to nearby villages and towns in the “Golden Ring” of Russia, tours of cathedrals and museums, and probably most memorable, having dinner in a family home! The participants all enjoyed the wonderful Russian cuisine, including freshly harvested vegetables from the families’ dachas. They were also able to meet with the Vladimir Sister Cities Board and learn about the history of our Vladimir-Canterbury Sister Cities Association.

Following the wonderful experience in Vladimir, the groups traveled to Moscow for two and a half days before flying home. They were able to walk on Red Square, visit Lenin’s Tomb, and just walk the city of Moscow! They had incredible learning and sharing of knowledge and experiences, and are looking forward to their next exchange.

The School of Kinesiology and Recreation at Illinois State University welcomed their third group of visitors from Vladimir State University's Institute of Physical Culture and Sports in April 2017 for a short - term student/faculty study abroad program.

Vladimir State University, named after Alexander and Nikolay Stoletovs, is comprised of 12 Institutes or Colleges. The Institute of Physical Culture and Sports is very similar to the School of Kinesiology and Recreation with majors that include exercise physiology, physical education, recreation management, and therapeutic recreation.

Illinois State University welcomed six guests. These guests included Alexander Vlasov, Head of the Department of Theory and the Methodology of Physical Education and Sports, Giulnara Evseeva, Associate Professor of the Department of Physical Education and Sports, Nadir Magomedov, Professor of the Department of Physical Education and Sports, Aleksandr Isaev, Student of the Institute of Physical Education and Sports, Svetlana Galitskaia, Head of the English Department, and Olga Komyagina, Associate Professor of the English Department.

While here they visited classes in the School of Kinesiology and Recreation, shared current trends and practices in our professions, and visited local facilities where our students complete internships and work following graduation. Cultural excursions were provided for the group, including a visit to Springfield, Chicago, and the Sister Cities Photo Exhibition.

The Illinois State University Department of Kinesiology and Recreation is most grateful for the incredible support from the Vladimir Canterbury Sister Cities Association, as well as for our amazing host families. **Mennonite College of Nursing, Transcultural
Nursing Student Exchange

Each year in May the Mennonite College of Nursing (MCN) sends a group of six nursing students with one of MCN's long standing faculty, David Jansen, to visit Vladimir Medical College (VMC). This year's students were Erica Renzi, Adrienne Sulit, Patricia Buno, Sarah Wortman, Anna Kastelic and Samantha Solis.

The group spends two full weeks tending to a very busy schedule of activities during their stay and is introduced to the culture of healthcare in Vladimir and the surrounding region. The students visit a variety of hospital settings, a very impressive blood transfusion center, Sheredar - a rehabilitation facility for ill children, a children's nursing home, a nursing home for military veterans, just to name a few of the sites visited. Students are able to sit in a classroom with other nursing students to take in faculty lectures.

Our hosts at VMC also provide the group with so many wonderful cultural excursions including many of the staples of Vladimir such as the Golden Gate, the Water Tower and the Cathedral of Assumption. The group visits the Vladimir Gymnastics School which trains many Olympic gymnasts. The students are invited to enjoy a full day of fun picnicking and spending time with current VMC students.

Graduates of VMC who have traveled to visit us at MCN take time from their busy schedules to greet our group and spend time touring them through the city. They even have a day to spend in Suzdal, Murom, and this year took the train to travel to Moscow.

Our students and faculty always have incredible stories and new knowledge to share upon their return. MCN students share their transcultural nursing experience with our nursing college through journals and speaking at large group meetings to encourage newer students to consider the opportunity in upcoming semesters.

Mennonite College of Nursing will host a group of four visitors from Vladimir Medical College October 9th through October 23rd. The group will include two VMC students, a nursing VMC faculty, and Nina Bedova, also faculty at VMC who serves as the translator and group leader. The group will visit

many different healthcare facilities in Bloomington/Normal and the surrounding region. The group will also be hosted for a day by Tom Carroll in Chicago taking in the city sites. They will be entertained with a variety of cultural excursions in the Bloomington/Normal area as well as. For the third year in a row, the group will participate in the ISU and MCN Homecoming festivities.

William Luther White Forum Presentation
The 2nd annual **William L. White International Forum** will take place at 7:00 pm on November 6 at the Calvary United Methodist Church, 1700 N Towanda Ave, Normal, IL.

Bill was a pioneer and mentor for our Association. He led 4 trips to the Soviet Union before the Association was organized in 1986. He continuously served on our board and on numerous committees until his death in 2015.

The forum speaker this year will be Dr. Mark Soderstrom, Associate Professor and Program Chair Department of History, Aurora University, Aurora, IL. The topic of Dr. Soderstrom's talk will be: *Putin's Empire of the Past: History, Memory, and Politics in 21st-Century Russia*.

Vladimir Putin ranks among the twenty-first century's most infamous and controversial leaders. In Russia itself, however, he remains enormously popular. Why? This presentation will offer some perspective on this question, focusing on the ways in which narratives about Russian history—and about the Russian Empire in particular—have been employed to bolster the popularity of the Russian president and his policies.

Dr. Soderstrom is a historian of the Russian Empire. He completed his PhD in History at Ohio State University. At Aurora University he has published papers, written numerous book reviews, given major professional presentations, and achieved significant professional service. Dr. Soderstrom's teaching interests vary widely; he is fond of engaging students in the classroom. He has travelled widely across Russia and has studied at Moscow State University, St. Petersburg State University, Irkutsk State Linguistic University.

Other stored materials include Association publications, grant information, annual reports, medical partnership documents, student exchanges, minutes and treasurer reports, and assorted books and audio-visual materials. Hands-on access is available for use only at the Museum library.

1. Go to www.mchistory.org
2. Go to the menu bar (the gray bar) and hover over "Research"
3. From "Research" scroll down and click on "Finding Aids"
4. From "Finding Aids" scroll down and click on either "Organizations" or "A-Z"
5. From either "Organizations" or "A-Z," scroll down to Vladimir/Canterbury Sister City Committee Collection
6. Click on the Vladimir/Canterbury Sister City Committee Collection, and you will be prompted to either open or save an Adobe Acrobat file containing the finding aid.




Now about me meeting my aunt.
